


## JOYS OF SPRING 2024

Abloom in the Luxembourg Gardens

Perhaps the loveliest place to contemplate spring is from a green garden chair in the middle of the Jardin du Luxembourg in Paris.

This luxe city park first sprouted in 1612 when Marie de Medici, widow of England's King Henry IV, took solace in France, building the Luxembourg Palace as her new home.

Yet another love story of note blossomed here, in Victor Hugo's Les Misérables, when Marius and

Cosette first meet in this storied garden. In apparent celebration of said l'amour, 15th century

marble cherubs hoist huge urns that overflow with spring color like floral fountains. Once, during a long layover, I hopped on the Paris RER train from de Gaulle airport into the city for a one-seat picnic in the park. In under an hour, including a patisserie pitstop, I was nibbling on a

jambon et fromage croissant, pondering how our days seem to dart by like the toy sailboats dappling the pond here. You may be able to locate my alfresco lunch spot from outer space, or, more simply, Apple Maps. Zoom in on Paris to easily find the garden, so prominent amid the sprawl, in the 6th arrondissement,

just south of where the Seine scribes its "S" curves across the city. Now, find the octagon shaped pool next to the imposing palace, set like a cut jewel on a queen's necklace. Here you'll find my green garden chair, awaiting your own "Les Contemplations" of spring.

## Worthy Remains of Winter


If lemons are still hanging in your tree like neglected Christmas ornaments, these ideas may inspire a harvest, before they fall to spring cleaning.





The sumptuous allure of the Meyer lemon is due not only to its warm lantern-like glow, but also the artistic malleability of its rind. Its peel appeal. This regal fruit, of Mandarin heritage, scintillates the


